#### Dr. Jonathan Hayashi Reaching The Unreached in the Missionary Graveyard

I had the wonderful opportunity to share the upcoming Japan mission trip this morning with Overseas Instruction in Counseling. A few Sundays ago I presented this information at HSBC. I have had several people who said, "Pastor Jonathan, I wish I was able to attend and hear but I was out of town!" I wanted to take advantage here and share a bit so you

all know how you can be praying for me and the mission trip.

Today, Japan is the largest, currently non-evangelized, nation that is completely open to missionaries. Japan is known by many to be a difficult mission field. Japan has now been known as "the missionary's graveyard."

Many missionaries have traveled to Japan only to return to their home country, discouraged. The difficulty with the time of cultural differences and language barriers that take years or even decades to overcome overwhelms the missionaries. Most people in Japan have never heard the gospel and have had little opportunity to hear the Gospel.

It is said that the average age of Japanese pastors is between 60 and 70 years old. More than 75% of the pastors are over the age of 55. There are more pastors over the age of 80 than pastors under 30. When pastors retire, churches close. The average attendance of a good-sized church is about 30 people. Churches in the countryside often have only 4-10 believers.

Having grown up in the country of Japan, I quite understand this difficulty. Culture is beyond the language barrier, which often missionaries spend most of the time on the field. However, to understand one's cultural context perhaps is more important compared to even the language. However, despite the language barrier, I believe the message of Christ will transcend cultural differences and will leave imprints of the gospel in the lives of many.

God is at work in the country of Japan. However, God is at work in our immediate context as well. The scripture is true when it says "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." (Luke 10:2).

The trip is really a wonderful opportunity to go along with incredibly gifted leaders on a mission trip to the country of Japan to train Biblical Counselors. It will be an incredible 9 days filled with opportunities to share the gospel of Jesus through disciple-making as we work alongside many other churches. I am looking forward to speaking at the Asia Pacific Biblical Counseling Conference in November with speakers such as these and many others:

BSU Update - live compelling lives...

It has been an exciting Fall already! We've seen students connecting and getting involved - from being a part of the worship team, to going to churches with us, to being a part of our outreach that we do



on campus with our tabling and outdoor worship services and more. Seeing them so loved and encouraged and already inviting their friends who are not believers, has been really so kind of God! Our students have been so wonderful just trying to engage with other students and in really trying to be believers that are living compelling lives. A huge part of that for us has been sharing how truth should never travel faster than love; but that they should always be journeying together in our lives and our conversations and all we do. One of our students is finding that other guys are coming to him and asking about worship, about God. One guy who says he is agnostic came over to our students as they were hanging out and wanted to talk more about who God is because he is feeling that the life he is living is just not it. Others want to come to things we are doing because they are seeing how our students are living, and how our students are treating them and others with such love...and seeing them serving on the worship team. I love the work our students are doing to be in God's word, to be together, to serve and pray. They keep being faithful in who they are on Saturday night as well as on Sunday morning. Even their peers who don't know Jesus are seeing it and it's compelling to them. It is so encouraging to see disciples who are capable of following Jesus, not just "I have Jesus but I will live my own way". There are roots growing in their walk and lives of faith they are trying to live out. Their character is matching their spirituality - that is probably THE most rewarding thing we are seeing in this new Fall. God is so honoring their faithfulness through wonderful opportunities to keep being lights to their friends. We were doing a table last week where we were handing out bubbles, I know how crazy that is, but they loved it. We usually have a question at our table because we want to try and get students to engage in conversations. The question was "If you could wish for one change in the world in your lifetime, what would you wish for?" One girl came over and asked how we would answer that. For the next 10 minutes we just had a wonderful conversation with her about how God really is the answer to life and all the struggles we face and why the answer really is Jesus and that is why it is so essential to have Him from the inside out. Then another girl, who grew up going to church but decided to be Catholic a few years back, came over. She shared a big reason she switched was because the Christians she was around were just not very loving or kind. Oh my goodness that is so hard to hear. Then she came by our table and started talking and having conversations. Now she's starting to connect and come to the BSU because she shared that we were so kind and loving to her. There is so much God is doing as we try to model and live lives that are compelling and just try to live lives where our character matches our spirituality. To live by faith...the BSU
